Assessment at the graduate level is an important aspect of Ohio State's accreditation by the Higher Learning Commission. By defining learning goals and gathering data about their accomplishment, informed decisions can be made about how to improve graduate student learning.

- First, what do we want students to know and do by the end of their graduate program at Ohio State?
- Second, how will we know if they achieve these goals?
 This kind of assessment is essentially an extension of what faculty do every day with individual students applied to an entire degree program.


