Particularly for students in their Junior year, the ACT and SAT become a looming presence over their academic career. During the Spring of 2018, Upward Bound juniors will have the opportunity to take on additional ACT test prep exercises with Jacob and other Upward Bound staff. Juniors who **successfully**

complete the test prep exercises will have the opportunity to work alongside Jacob to schedule small-group college visits to a college in Ohio during a school day.

Everybody Can Serve

On January 15th, 2018, the Upward Bound community joined the College of Wooster to volunteer and participate in community dialogues for the Martin Luther King, Jr. Day of Service. “Everybody can be great,” Dr. King said, “because everybody can serve.” The idea of serving your community and your world was central to the morning

speeches we heard from the Dean of the College and the head of the Wooster branch of the NAACP. In addition, we were able to hear the incredible story of Natalie Warne. Warne, activist and TED speaker, helped organize a campaign to bring awareness to the plight of children kidnapped to become child soldiers in Africa. Her efforts in the Invisible Children campaign in Chicago attracted Oprah’s attention which propelled the Invisible Children campaign into the limelight as the volunteers told their story on her show, highlighting Warne as a key figure in that branch of the campaign. She was 17 at the time.

Warne stressed the importance of the idea that *everybody* can serve. No matter how old you are, you can change the world. The Upward Bound community then put her ideas into action after a tour of the College of Wooster and a justice dialogue with other TRIO programs. We gathered to create personal messages to put into care packages of hygiene products given to people who needed them. We gave our time to serve our community and help drive out the darkness of poverty with the light of service.





Senior Scholarships




Applications for the Chris Miller Memorial Scholarship and the Chip Yankello Optimum Scholarship will be given to 2018 seniors soon! The number and value of the scholarships will depend on scholarship funds and the merit of the applications. The scholarships will be awarded at the Senior Recognition Ceremony.

Each scholarship requires the application and an essay, the question as well as specific guidelines are listed below. To be considered for the application, the application must be either submitted or postmarked by April 2, 2018.

The Chris Miller Memorial Scholarship

To compete for a scholarship, an Upward Bound student must:

- Be a 2018 graduating senior
- Have a record of being in good standing with the program in regard to attendance, academic achievement, and positive participation

The Chip Yankello Optimum Scholarship

To compete for a scholarship, an Upward Bound student must:

- Be a 2018 graduating senior
- Have a record of being in good standing with the program in regard to attendance, academic achievement, and positive participation
- Have a cumulative GPA of 2.75 or more, or a score of 18 or more on the ACT
- Have been accepted at an accredited college with plans to enroll full time
- Complete the application and essay by April 2, 2018
