Proposal for Hosting Midwest Archives Conference Fall Symposium at The Ohio State University Libraries (Columbus, Ohio) in 2017

Introduction

Most archivists are faced with creating exhibits, from one case displays to multi-layered exhibits, but often do not have the necessary training to build ones that are efficient and effective. The Ohio State University Libraries proposes hosting the 2017 MAC fall symposium titled "Transitioning from Good to Great Exhibits." The symposium will be held at the William Oxley Thompson Memorial Library (Friday) and the Billy Ireland Cartoon Library & Museum (Saturday). Both locations were recently renovated and showcase new display and exhibition areas. They are ideal venues to explore best practices and to discuss new ways for archivists to achieve their institution's exhibition goals. About the Outside Experts

Sara Sterkenburg, Cataloging & Exhibition Services Librarian at Vanderbilt University, gave a recent presentation at RBMS called "Leveraging Exhibitions as a Needs-Based Skill Development Program in Libraries: a Case Study at Vanderbilt University Libraries." During the presentation, Sterkenburg discussed Vanderbilt's new orientation toward the 21st century technologies demanded widely by users. In 2014, Vanderbilt's exhibition team designed the current season around this idea, leveraging exhibits as a skill-development program. They focused on teaching XML markup, version control using Github, copyright, open access, and descriptive metadata. Instead of seeing exhibits as a finished product, the Vanderbilt team sees exhibits as processes, and a skill building exercise and opportunity.

Dr. Molly Schwartzburg, University of Virginia earned her PHD in American Literature from Stanford in 2004, with a specialization in modern and contemporary poetry and the avant-garde. Schwartzburg previously worked at the Harry Ransom Center, and has embraced an interdisciplinary approach to exhibits that explores both literature and the visual arts. Swartzburg approaches exhibits from a comparative perspective, drawing on both the resources of a library and practices of museums.
