


"I spoke to my individual clients about how voting can help them achieve their goals.


We are very rural down here and some of the barriers to voting are a bit different."

## **LOOKING AHEAD**

# Incorporate student feedback to improve the fellowship experience

- Start the program earlier for a longer orientation period
- Increase clarity around contact tracking
- Create additional opportunities for online students to connect to CSW events

## **Improve Data Collection**

- Identification and deploy established voter engagement tools (apps / software / tracking)
- Work with local and national civic engagement organizations to identify and deploy these tools

## Secure External Funding

- Ensure sustainability of the program
- Scale to add additional fellows
