He is extremely intelligent, organized, poised during rounds and with patients. He had an excellent didactic presentation on a difficult topic. Both residents and our fellow gave me the same feedback.
One additional comment: Zach took care of a GI patient during the inpatient service who also happens to be a patient I follow closely as an outpatient. The family privately told me how he went above and beyond to answer questions. These are the intangibles that we cannot teach readily.

Focusing on pertinent, patient specific data and issues
continue to build fund of knowledge
Continue to read; hone skills on ensuring that you target the primary medical issues pertaining to the patient first. However, all are minor observations.
Zach can continue to work on focusing on pertinent portions of the medical history and using this knowledge to develop diagnostic and management plans.
Zachary should continue to work on making his presentations more concise. He is very thorough; however, often overly detailed in giving information which may not be pertinent. He should remember that it is not a bad thing if you need to be asked for more information after a presentation, as long as you know the answers.
Like everyone, even residents, just continue to read about your patients' pathologies to understand them on a deeper level!
While he did a good job, he didn't always seem to understand the next step of the plan for his patient's, which is more of a intern-level skill. Keep doing a good job with your patients and the higher level of understanding will follow!
