A tracheostomy is a surgically made hole that goes through the front of your neck into your trachea, or windpipe, and uses a breathing tube placed through the hole to help you breathe. (NIH, n.d.)

In the event of difficulty breathing: Breathing fast, hard, has a change in skin color, lots of mucus, ventilator may be alarming.

- Remain calm.
- Assess trach site to make sure trach is midline and in airway.
- Suction student according to protocol.
- Clean or change inner cannula.
- If distress continues, call for SN or EMS if unavailable.
- Provide ventilations with Ambu bag 1 breath every 5 seconds around trach site until help arrives.

In the event the trach is pulled out:

- Remain calm.
- Notify School Nurse.
- Reinsert back up tracheostomy with the aid of obturator, if unable, insert downsize back up trach.
- Call 911 if unable to insert. Provide ventilations with Ambu bag 1 breath every 5 seconds around trach site until EMS arrive

In the event of a building evacuation: Follow planned evacuation procedures with student and take emergency bag and equipment.

Emergency Bag Items (developed in collaboration with

parents/guardians/nurse/teachers to ensure student's safety. Individualized per student)

- 1. Special medical equipment (medication pump, ventilator, oxygen, back up trach, and downsize trach, obturator, ambu bag, trach ties, suction, etc)
- 2. Medications
- 3. Communication needs/devices
- 4. Incentives to keep students quiet
- 5. Pertinent medical information card
