Muse: Mickalene Thomas Photographs and tête-à-tête At Virginia MOCA May 12-August 13, 2017



Muse features renowned artist Mickalene Thomas. Using photography as her medium, Thomas explores the complex world of identity, race, and class. Thomas often invokes in these pictures the classical female nudes seen in art history, but replaces objectification with a visible connection to the subject. In tandem with her own work, Thomas has selected fifteen photos from artists she admires or takes inspiration from. She titles this part of the exhibit *tête-à-tête*, which is French for a private conversation between two people.

ABOUT THE ARTIST

Mickalene Thomas was born and raised in Camden, New Jersey, by her mother Sandra Bush. Thomas received her BFA from the Pratt institute in Brooklyn, New York, followed by her MFA in Painting from Yale University School of Art in 2002. Through her art she reveals a multi-layered vision of what it means to be a woman and builds upon common definitions of beauty. Her work often explores notions of black female celebrity and identity. Her subjects are sometimes well known figures such as Oprah Winfrey, Eartha Kitt, and Condoleeza Rice. Her portrait of Michelle Obama was the first individual portrait done of the first lady. With inspiration from the Hudson River School, Édouard Manet, Henri Matisse, and Romare Bearden, Thomas delves into ideas of beauty from a contemporary perspective combined with more recent developments in popular culture and pop art.


DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

The display on the cover is an embellished recreation of a 70s living room; Thomas's shoots are typically done in self-produced settings such as this. What do you think of the living room display in the cover photo? Is it similar to any you've seen before?

- Is it a room you'd want to spend time in? Why or why not?
- Do you think the space you are can influence your thoughts and feelings? Why or why not?

MINI LESSON

- The image on the right is featured in tête-à-tête. Do you like the clothes pictured? How do you think style of dress influences others' idea of you?
- Do you pick out your own clothes? Do your parents? Are most of them hand-me-downs? If you could wear whatever you wanted to, what would it be? Draw or write about your outfit.
- Have you or has anyone you know ever made their own clothing? If so, describe it. With a parent's help, try cutting, dyeing, and/or sowing your own shirt.
