The 4 A's of Motivation

- Affiliation
- Achievement
 - Altruism
 - Acceptance

Affiliation Abusive Parent

To be accepted as a 4-H'er even if it is through their child.

Example: The parent may not have been active in 4-H, so they will push the child to take part in all 4-H activities.



Achievement

Competitive Parent

The need to succeed—even if they have to bully their child into it.

Example: As a parent you showed steers in 4-H and you make your child show steers in 4-H even if they aren't interested.



Altruism Neglectful Parent

The selfless idea that they can be all things to all people.

Example: A parent that tries to be a role model, a buddy and a disciplinarian but neglects the needs of their own child.



Acceptance

Vicarious Parent

The need to belong—even if it is through their child.

Example: A mother wearing the same clothes as her teenage daughter and going to the mall with her group of friends.

PROGRAM....

A caring and supportive parent is one essential component of a positive youth development program.

Positives of Parental Involvement

For Club Members

- Gain support and confidence from working with interested adult/parent.
- · Participate with their parents in a common interest.
- Receive more individual attention and guidance.
- · Youth mimic their parent's positive, enthusiastic attitudes.

For the Parents

- · Get to know their children's friends.
- · Make new friends and acquaintances within the community.
- Show love and concern for their children by maintaining an interest in their activities and helping them meet their goals.
- · Help their children learn and grow.
- · Share experiences with their children.
- · Improve relationships with their children.
- · Make a contribution to youth in the community.

For Club Leaders/Volunteers


- Can delegate jobs to responsible parents to allow time for development of additional club activities.

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
For Members

- Embarrassing
- Discouraging
- · Disappointed in how their parents act
- Fed-up
- Annoyed
- Want to quit/drop out
- · Lose of interest



For Parents

- Brings shame to self
- Brings shame to child
- Loses creditability with children, volunteers and community
- · Embarrassment to self
- · Make them look little or overbearing



For Leaders/Volunteers

- · More of a hindrance than help
- Distracting
- Discouraging
- Causes Stress
- · Makes them rethink about their role as a volunteer



For Clubs

- Embarrassment
- Causes Stress
- Members Drop-Out
- · Little involvement of members and other parents
- Adult-domination creates unwelcoming environments (no sharing of ideas, etc.)

- 1 day volunteers—assisting with fundraisers, booths, refreshments within the club.
- Project Judging
- Demonstrations
- Organizing/leading workshops, clinics and other educational activities.

HEAD to give my child the information I can, to help him/her see things clearly and to make wise decisions.


HEART to encourage and support my child no matter whether he/she has successes or disappointments.
