Why Do Community Service Projects?

- The 4-H pledge "hands to greater service...for my club, my community, my country, and my world"
 One of the eight key elements "Opportunity to value and practice service for
- others"

Community Service Projects

- Doing a community service project, is only one part of a service learning project.
- In order to "Learn by Doing" we must facilitate an environment in which youth can succeed.

But....How?





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Five Essential Steps

- 1. Plan
- 2. Review
- 3. Implement
- 4. Evaluate
- 5. Report





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Step 1: Plan

- The project should be selected by the membership to instill ownership of the project to the youth who are planning it.
- Make a large list of ideas to choose from.
- Identify those that meet the community needs.
- · List the pros and cons of each.
- Vote to make a decision or let youth choose different projects to work on.





Step 1: Plan (Continued)

- Members should set their goals. Be sure they are:
- Specific, measurable, achievable, realistic, and timely.
- Develop a timeline of when everything will happen so the entire group is aware and can hold each other accountable.





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Step 2: Review

- Members should select a leader for the project, or chairperson.
- Members should go through step-by-step processes of what will happen, ensuring they will have all the supplies necessary to complete the task.
- Members should ask questions about the processes, expectations, and if they think a problem might arise.
- Make sure you help members think through situations where bad weather is possible, or how to have a back up plan in place.





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Step 2: Review

- Have the members determine the budget for the service project.
- Determine who will collect information for reporting, take pictures, and write the article.
- If it is a partial group, have them figure out who is going and how to contact them.





Step 3: Implement

- · Members should do the actual work.
- Adults can assist in showing, but should not be doing the work.
- Ensure there are enough tasks for everyone who has come to help for the day.
- Do the activities being completed facilitate teamwork and build friendships?





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Step 4: Evaluate

- Reflect with the members on the experience of the project, the role they took, and how this project could lead to other projects for the future.
- Ask each child what worked, what didn't?





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Step 5: Report

- Express gratitude to each other for a service well done.
- Write a newspaper article (pictures are great) explaining who you are and what you did
- Report the hours of work completed, and how many youth participated to your local Extension Office.
