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4-H is an OSU Extension Program

Ohio 4-H is an educational program provided by Ohio State University Extension. Each county's program is provided through a partnership between OSU Extension and local county commissioners. In Paulding County, we offer 4-H Youth Development, Agriculture and Natural Resources, and Family and Consumer Sciences programming. The staff from all areas work together as a team to deliver quality educational programming.



What is 4-H?

4-H is a non-formal educational youth development program offered to individuals ages 5 to 19. No matter what projects you select or how you participate, all 4-H programs focus on active involvement and quality experiences that stimulate lifelong learning of values and skills.

The 4 H's

"Head" to clearer thinking



4-H allows youth the opportunity to learn new things through projects and programs while being actively engaged in their learning. One of the main goals of 4-H is to have youth develop life skills that help them succeed. Some of these life skills include leadership, responsibility, dedication, communication, and self-confidence.

"Heart" to greater loyalty



Youth are taught to be reliable and loyal in their heart and understand what it means to take responsibility for their projects and to follow through. 4-H gives youth positive relationships with adults and peers through leaders and teens. Youth are shown why it is important to care for others as well as everything else they do in life.

"Hands" for larger service



4-H'ers are busy with their hands all year long learning new things and caring for their projects with hands-on experiences. Members also use their hands to give back to the community. Part of 4-H is teaching youth the importance of serving the community, country, and world.

"Health" to better living



Knowing how to cook and grow food, and appreciate art allows 4-H'ers to gain an understanding of how the world works and how to live healthily. Projects such as photography, canning, arts and crafts, sewing, collections, and cooking help youth realize what it takes to have a healthy lifestyle and how to spend their leisure time. 4-H also strives to make sure youth are physically and emotionally safe.





What does 4-H teach?

4-H offers more than 200 projects. Topics of these projects include: About 4-H, Animal Sciences, Clothing and Textile Sciences, Communication and Public Speaking, Creative and Leisure Arts, Food and Nutrition, Healthy Living, Home Living, Leadership and Citizenship, Money Management, Natural Resources, STEM, Self-Determined, and Workforce Preparation. Calendar of Events

Paulding County 4-H creates a calendar of events for each 4-H year. This calendar can be found on the Clover Connection website. While we try our best to plan, we do add additional opportunities and events to our calendar. We encourage members and families to check out the calendar as well as watch for postings on the Clover Connection which will announce upcoming events.

If you are a member completing a livestock project, we also have a calendar for important dates sorted by species. These dates are critical to our livestock projects and members must review these dates to know when animals must be born, in possession, and when tagging takes place. Who is eligible to join 4-H?

Ohio 4-H membership is based on a child's age AND their grade as of January 1 of the calendar year. A youth's 4-H eligibility ends December 31 of the year he or she turns 19.





What are the programs 4-H offers?

Cloverbuds

Eligibility for the Cloverbud program begins when a youth turns 5 years old AND is in Kindergarten. This program is a non-competitive, activity-based program designed to have fun, interactive experiences. Cloverbud activities occur during club meetings but do not have any "take-home" projects. In this program, 4-H Volunteers lead activities during club activities that explore topics such as health, earth, the environment, plants, animals, and more.

Community Club Program

Eligibility for the Community Club program begins when a youth member turns 8 years old AND in the third grade of the program year, or 9 years old regardless of grade level. Youth participating in the Community Club program are eligible to complete any of the Ohio 4-H projects listed in the Ohio 4-H Family Guide. This program is a competitive, project-oriented program designed to teach life skills through projects the member takes. Joining 4-H is a privilege and responsibility for individuals and is subject to the Ohio 4-H Code of Conduct and applicable policies of The Ohio State University.

SPIN Clubs

Special Interest 4-H Clubs, commonly known as SPIN Clubs, are short-term clubs that focus on specific topics or projects. Most SPIN clubs pop-up throughout the year based on the interest of volunteers, youth, or a combination of both. We do offer scheduled SPIN Club programs, such as the Green Thumb program, which has a set schedule each summer.





Choosing a Club

Paulding County 4-H is home to 15 4-H Clubs. These clubs meet monthly for 1.5 to 2 hours. We have clubs that meet in Antwerp, Cecil, Grover Hill, Paulding, and Oakwood. Clubs meet at various dates and times which makes it very helpful for families to find a club that meets family schedules. When do I need to enroll?


The enrollment deadline for 4-H in Paulding County is the first Friday in January. All enrollment is completed by the member's family in 4-H Online. We highly encourage families to enroll as soon as possible after November 1st of each year to aid in communication efforts. Office Associate, TyAnna Miles, manages the 4-H Online system and will be happy to help you with any computer or account-related questions.





Choosing Projects

Choosing the perfect project can seem like a daunting task for our members, especially when we offer over 220 of them. To help with the project selection process, members and their families have a couple of different options to explore all that is offered. The Paulding County Extension Office houses a copy of all project books that are currently offered through Ohio 4-H. Youth may stop by the office during normal business hours to look through project books. Members may also view the Ohio 4-H Family Guide which lists each project with a description. The Ohio 4-H Family Guide can be viewed by visiting https://ohio4h.org/familyguide. A third available option, and very helpful, is Project Central. Project Central is a searchable database of all the current 4-H projects offered. Project reviews left by 4-H members can be found and members can view a selection of project book pages to gauge interest. Ordering Project Books

Ordering 4-H project books has never been easier. Project books can be ordered online and shipped directly to your house. To order books, visit https://extensionpubs.osu.edu/. From there, you can search for your project book by the project name or number. Extension Publishing is now offering free shipping on all orders totaling \$40 or more. Families are encouraged to order project books together if an order does not total more than \$40 to save shipping costs. The free shipping coupon code will be published in our Clover Connection posts as well as on the Extension Publishing website.

When do I have to have projects selected?

Project selection must be completed when the family completes the 4-H Online enrollment. The 4-H Online database requires a project to be selected to submit enrollment. All 4-H projects must be declared by the enrollment deadline. Youth may pick projects to work on for the following year as soon as our county fair is complete, unless they are competing at the State Fair for that project, which would push the start date of working on the project to after the State Fair.

Are we able to drop projects?

Dropping a 4-H project can be done. We mostly see projects being dropped due to time constraints or a project being too difficult for a member. A member can drop a project at any time by contacting the Extension Office and informing them of the decision.





While there is no specific deadline to drop a project, we do ask for the member or their family to notify us as soon as a decision is made. This is because we start planning our project judging at the end of March each year and our planning is based on the number of projects being completed.

How much does it cost to be in 4-H?

Thanks to the support of Paulding County with our levy, there is no cost to join 4-H. Most of our clubs do have membership dues that are paid to the club. These dues ensure the club has the funding it needs to purchase supplies for club activities, booth and parade decorations, and other expenses that may occur.

While 4-H membership in Paulding County does not have a cost, completing projects and participating in activities and programs do. Members are required to purchase the project books needed for their project which are typically \$10 each but can be higher based on the project. There is also the cost of materials needed to complete the project. We have 4-H projects that will have only the cost of the book to projects that can cost thousands of dollars.

4-H Member Expectations

Being a 4-H member is a privilege and responsibility for individuals and is subject to the Ohio 4-H Code of Conduct and applicable policies of The Ohio State University. Becoming a part of Paulding County 4-H is a privilege, not a right.

 Members are required to enroll in an approved, chartered 4-H Community Club and select at least one 4-H project from the Ohio 4-H Family Guide.





- Members must attend AT LEAST 50% of scheduled club meetings with a minimum meeting attendance of four club meetings.
 - Paulding County 4-H fully supports the decision of the community club should they choose to enforce consequences for poor participation and attendance.
- Members may enroll in more than one club, provided they select at least one project within each club. It is the member's responsibility to complete their projects and keep track of deadlines associated with them – 4-H volunteers are here to assist in communicating deadlines and additional information.
- Members are expected to participate in as many club meetings and activities as possible. This demonstrates a commitment to the club and the 4-H Program overall.
- 4-H'ers are required to complete one demonstration within their club. Demonstration topics should be based on the project the member is taking.
 - First-year project members are the exception first-year members may complete a demonstration on a topic of their choice.
 - Demonstrations should consist of "how to" dialogue and be presented in a logical yet entertaining manner.
- Community Service Projects All members of the club need to be involved in completing at least one community service project. These projects are an important part of promoting citizenship and community contributions.









Membership Across County Lines

Youth members are expected to affiliate with the 4-H Program in their county of residence. Exceptions are available and interested parties MUST contact the 4-H Extension Educator for more information.

- The Across County Line membership is for age-eligible
 4-H Members who reside in a neighboring county.
 Please review this policy if you wish to join Paulding
 County 4-H but reside in a neighboring county.
- 4-H membership in TWO counties simultaneously is NOT permitted.
- In situations where the county of residence does not have a 4-H program, youth may NOT join another county.

Individual Community Club Rules

Clubs are required to adopt a constitution which is provided as a template by Ohio 4-H.

Clubs may also adopt individual rules by creating by-laws to attach to their constitution, provided those rules are not in conflict with state guidelines.

Some examples of rules adopted by individual clubs are:

- Club dues policies
- Maximum number of members
- Types of projects permitted
- Attendance policies
- Fulfillment of officer/member responsibilities. Clubs are not permitted to vote on accepting or not accepting members into their club. This is a clear violation of Ohio and National 4-H Council policy.

Clubs are required to open and maintain a bank account for purposes of financial transactions of its members and/or club.







Examples: fees paid to the club for membership dues, expenses incurred for club meetings, special club events, etc.

To remain in good standing, clubs must meet the following expectations each year:

- Ensure that all members meet the membership enrollment deadline, which is the 1st Friday in January of each year.
- Plan and hold a minimum of 8 meetings.
- Provide members with a written schedule for meetings.
- Elect an officer team which must consist of a President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer. Clubs should consider electing other officers, including News Reporter, Safety, Health, Recreation, and Community Service.
- Complete at least one Community Service Project as a club.
- Complete IRS and Ohio 4-H required financial reporting:
 - File year-end financial report with OSU Extension by January 31st annually.
 - 990N ePostcard filing with the IRS will be completed by the 4-H Extension Educator or designee by the May 15th deadline.

Dual Membership in 4-H and FFA

Ohio 4-H members are sometimes also FFA members, often within the same county and sometimes in an adjacent county. These members especially need to keep in mind the 4-H policy about 4-H projects being separate from school projects. To keep work in both organizations clearly separate, 4-H members are advised to take







different species or non-livestock projects in the two organizations or, at a minimum, take market animals in one and breeding animals in the other. The idea is to refrain from exhibiting the same project more than once a year.

- Allowable examples include but are not limited to:
 - o Breeding Gilt (4-H) and Market Hog (FFA)
 - o Market Steer (4-H) and Market Hog (FFA)
 - Welding Doorstop (4-H) and Welding Boot Scraper (FFA)
- Examples of projects that are not able to be taken together include but are not limited to:
 - o Market Lamb (4-H) and Market Lamb (FFA)
 - Welding Doorstop (4-H) and Welding Doorstop (FFA)

4-H Still Project Judging and Evaluations

4-H members are expected to complete their 4-H project by participating in our 4-H project judging, which takes place during the week of the Paulding County Fair. This evaluation is an interview-style judging that is designed to be a positive experience that teaches youth valuable interview skills and provides a closure for the project. All still projects are evaluated for project completion which is outlined in the front of each project book as well as the project completion guidelines which are available in early spring of each year.

Members will meet with a judge for approximately 10 minutes to complete an interview. This interview assesses the knowledge gained from the project as well as any product that may have been produced while completing the project.





For project judging, members should bring items indicated in the Project Descriptions listed in the Project Completion Guide. Members may be asked to discuss project work, talk about their item(s) brought to judging and answer questions regarding their project.

4-H Livestock Judging and Evaluations

4-H members completing Livestock projects must keep in mind that there are required deadlines specific to each species. These deadlines as well as rules pertaining to each species can be found in the Livestock Department Guidelines that are posted on the Clover Connection under <u>Paulding County Fair → Livestock</u>. Members will find that each species has its own document to read, understand, and follow.

Livestock members are required to complete Quality Assurance Training each year. This training is put on by OSU Extension and is available multiple times beginning in January of each year. It is very important to think about Spring schedules when planning to complete Quality Assurance and it is recommended to complete the training as soon as possible. The Ohio Department of Agriculture has set a rule that Quality Assurance training must be completed prior to the 45-day mark before the start of a county fair. Failure to complete this training by the 45-day deadline will mean that the animal will not be eligible to be shown or sold at the county fair.

Livestock project members are also required to complete a Skillathon each year. Skillathon is the equivalent of the Still Project Judging for our still project members. Skillathons can be completed in-person or online. For youth wanting to compete for Skillathon awards, this must be done in-person. For Skillathon, members will be required to:





- Turn in their completed project book by the deadline announced
- Complete an evaluation of knowledge of the following topics. Please note that only 3 of these topics will be evaluated in any given year.
 - Parts of the animal
 - o Breeds of the species
 - Medication Labels
 - Medication Inserts
 - Breed Traits
 - Equipment used for raising the species
 - Meat Cuts
 - o Conformation and/or Posture
 - Terminology
 - Disqualifications and Faults
- If completing the Skillathon in-person, youth will also participate in an interview over their project knowledge.

Skillathon is held on the last Wednesday of May every year.

So, What is Required of YOU?

What is the difference in a display vs. poster???

A "display" refers to a way to exhibit what you've made. In Woodworking projects, it's something you have built. In Clothing projects, it's the constructed piece of clothing/outfit. In a Photography or Art project, it is a portfolio of your images/artwork. Feel free to reach out to the Extension Office if it is unclear what is expected of your project's display.

A poster is for other projects where you may not necessarily make anything. Think about what your favorite part of the project was, what was most interesting about your project, what should someone know about the project, etc. This is your chance to be creative and shine!

Selections for the Ohio State Fair

Representing Paulding County 4-H at the Ohio State Fair is an honor and privilege. Youths are selected based on their project interview that is conducted during the Paulding County Fair. Most projects offered through 4-H are eligible for the Ohio State Fair, but some are not. The Ohio 4-H Family Guide indicates which projects are eligible for participation at the Ohio State Fair.

Youth who have been selected to represent Paulding County at the Ohio State Fair will be announced during our Still Project Judging Award Ceremony which is held after each day of judging.

Families will then have the opportunity to discuss if they will be making the trip to the Ohio State Fair and will inform the Extension Office of their decision. Youth who elect to participate will be given a packet with specific





information as well as a pass for entry to the Ohio State Fair.

How do I complete my project to prepare for County Project Judging?

4-H project books outline what is needed to complete the project in the front of the project book. It is important to review the first couple of pages to ensure you know what the expectations are for completing the project. Please note that what is written in the front of the book are minimum requirements. Youth may complete more than the minimum stated. Completing more than the minimum stated will increase your chances of being selected to go to the Ohio State Fair as well as increase your chances of winning awards at both the Paulding County and Ohio State Fairs.

Youth and project helpers may also refer to the Project Completion Guidelines which are released in late winter/early spring.

How do I exhibit my project at the Paulding County Fair?

The Paulding County Fair is an opportunity to showcase your project and the efforts you have made for the year. It is a requirement that all projects be displayed for the fair. Each club is given a booth in the Extension Hall and all 4-H members must have their projects on display or represented.

For all still projects, this means your project MUST be in the booth before the start of the fair. Livestock youth should have some representation of their projects in the booth as well.





This not only shows the great work of all our 4-H members but also meets the expectations of the community who want to see the work that our amazing youth accomplish.

4-H Online and Fair Entry...What is the Difference?

Over the course of the year, you will hear from multiple people and read multiple posts about both 4-H Online and Fair Entry. Families can find themselves being very confused as we go through the year, especially when these databases are only used a couple of times each year for the typical 4-H family. Below is a quick explanation of each of the databases, what they are used for, and the timeline of when they are used.

4-H Online

4-H Online is the online database that Ohio 4-H uses to manage the 4-H program and is where 4-H families go to enroll in 4-H for the year. This is also where youth will declare their 4-H projects for the year. 4-H Online opens November 1st of each year for 4-H enrollment. All members must be enrolled by the first Friday in January to participate at the Paulding County Fair and be eligible for awards and other 4-H member opportunities.

Fair Entry

Fair Entry is the online database that the Paulding County Junior Fairboard uses to manage the Paulding County Junior Fair. This database is used in April and May to register for classes at the Paulding County Fair. Information specific to Fair Entry is sent out when it is time to start the registration process for the fair.





Interested in becoming a volunteer?

All our clubs are led by 4-H volunteers who give selflessly of themselves to our 4-H program and the youth who participate. They willingly share knowledge, experiences, and skills with the youth in their clubs to "make the best better". Volunteers required to complete are application, interview, background check, and yearly training to become and maintain their volunteer status. Paulding County 4-H is ALWAYS looking for volunteers to help our youth. Volunteer opportunities, such as being a club advisor, project helper, or SPIN Club advisor are available. If you are an adult who is looking for a way to make an impact on youth that will last a lifetime, contact the Extension Office to learn how to get started.









4-H Camp

Some would say that the highlight of 4-H in Paulding County is 4-H Camp. Paulding County 4-H camps at 4-H Camp Palmer every year. The dates for 4-H Camp are always July 9-13 no matter what days of the week this falls on. 4-H Camp Palmer is in Fulton County next to Harrison Lake State Park. Campers stay in cabins where they each have their own bunk and area for their personal belongings. Each cabin has well-trained camp counselors to guide campers during their time at camp. Campers are served three meals a day and an evening snack.

4-H Camp is for campers who have completed the 3rd grade through the completion of the 9th grade. Each year, camp counselors from Paulding County choose and develop a theme for the Paulding County 4-H Camp. Activities revolve around the theme as well as optional sessions that include swimming, line dancing, team building, crafts, canoeing, archery, nature hikes, and the high ropes course.

4-H members are encouraged to invite their friends to attend camp, even if they are not current 4-H members. Friends may request to be in the same cabin when registering. Information about registering for 4-H Camp, as well as the potential to receive partial camperships to help cover the registration cost, is released in late winter/early spring.
