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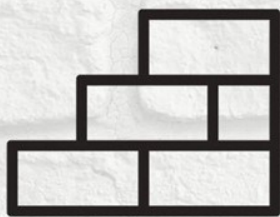

OHIO 4-H Motto: “To make the best better”

Ohio 4-H membership is based on a child’s age AND grade as of January 1 of the current calendar year. Eligibility for Cloverbud participation begins when a child is age 5 and enrolled in kindergarten. Eligibility for participation in 4-H projects and competitive events begins when a child is age 8 and in third grade. Any youth age 9 or above is eligible for project membership, regardless of grade level. Membership requires enrollment in an authorized Ohio 4-H club or group under the direction of an OSU Extension professional or an approved adult volunteer. A youth’s

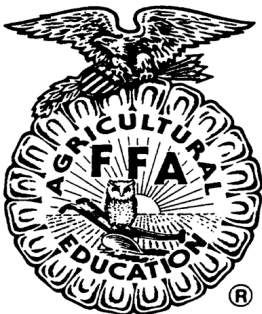
4-H eligibility ends December 31 the year he or she turns 19. Joining Ohio 4 H is a privilege and responsibility for individuals and is subject to the Ohio 4-H Code of Conduct and applicable policies of The Ohio State University. 4-H members “Learn by Doing” by enrolling in and completing a project.

Exhibitors show results of completed projects. There are more than 800 boys and girls enrolled in Washington County 4-H Clubs. Volunteer local advisors are credited for the leadership development among these young people. Each club is under the direction of one or more local advisors.

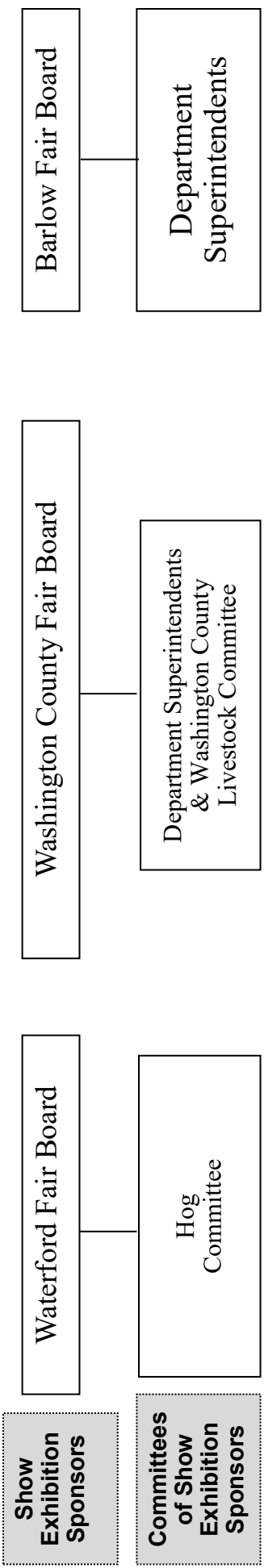

Washington County Market Livestock Program for Jr. Fair Exhibitors *Explanation of Organizational Chart* – The fair boards are on top of the chart because they are the decision making body for their livestock exhibitions (the shows and sales.) Each fair board is a separate show exhibition sponsor. Under the fair boards are the actual committees, who are subject to the approval of each fair board that they represent. The Market Livestock Project Committee has been formed as a subsidiary so that everyone on these committees can meet face to face and eliminate the confusion that is sometimes caused by having three committees and three fairs in the same county. New exhibitors and parents often find multiple sets of rules and regulations confusing and restraining. Moreover, the responsibility of the Fair Livestock Committees is to ensure that everyone is on the same page and that consistency spans the entire market livestock program as much as possible. Everyone working as a committee member is here for the children taking these projects. It is a privilege, not a right, to be a working member of any of these committees serving the youth of Washington County and the future of our agricultural industry. OSU Extension and the Agriculture Education Instructors (FFA leaders) provide support and guidance to the committees to ensure a successful program. These educational organizations provide the educational purpose of market livestock projects.

Inviting buyers and bidders

1. These guidelines are for all three fairs (Waterford, Washington County and Barlow).
2. It is the responsibility of exhibitors to ask area businesses to bid on their market livestock projects.
3. Exhibitors need to ask area businesses to bid on their projects for EACH fair where they will be selling an animal.
4. The “ask” can be done by sending letters with details about the project. But, buyers state the “ask” is most effective and appreciated when the exhibitor visits the business owners in person.
5. When visiting area businesses, youth should be accompanied by an adult. The exhibitor should introduce themselves, their project and why the business should attend an auction at an area fair.
6. **Buyers Packets** are available for potential buyers.
 - A. All 2023 buyers are listed on the next pages.
 - B. All of the 2023 buyers will be mailed passes to the 2024 sale. Letters are mailed prior to each fair.
 - C. If an exhibitor would like to invite a bidder/buyer who is not on this list, they need to call the OSU Extension office to request a buyer packet be sent to the new potential bidder. Exhibitors and parents cannot pick up the packets themselves, at the request of the cooperating fair boards.

Thanking Buyers

1. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to properly thank the business or individual who buys their project.
2. The minimum thank you at the fair should be finding the buyer and shaking their hand in appreciation, along with giving them a picture of the exhibitor and the project animal. It is not necessary to provide a present at the fair.
3. Exhibitors should personally visit the business/individual after the fair for a proper thank you.
4. Each year, the fair boards and committees purchase a full page ad in the Thanksgiving Day edition of the Marietta Times. Exhibitors are encouraged to take a copy or mail a copy of this ad to their buyers.

2024 Buyer Appreciation Receptions

1. Exhibitors should be ready for the sale and have their animal ready before the receptions begin.

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JUNIOR FAIR PARTICIPATION GUIDELINES

Age Requirements For Jr. Fair

1. To be eligible for cash premiums, 4-H/FFA members must be at least 8 years of age and enrolled in the 3rd grade as of January 1 of the current year and can show through the year in which the member attains the age of 19.
2. Ohio Administrative Code 901-19-01 (T) limits participation to exhibitors nine years of age or in the third grade through nineteen years of age, or as authorized to participate in either 4-H, FFA or other youth organization.
3. Cloverbud Members can exhibit at the fair and participate in Jr. Fair Activities. They may compete in open class events. They will receive a special participation ribbon for their 4-H exhibit but will not be awarded premiums.

County 4-H Project Judging Procedures

1. Project judging is required for all 4-H members to remain in good standing and to exhibit, show and/or sell at any of our three fairs. Market livestock, dairy, fancy and breeding animal projects will be required to participate in a skillathon for each of their livestock species. This includes horse project members (except Horseless Horse).
2. Evaluators will interview each member. Ratings of Superior, Excellent or Good will be given based on the member's project knowledge, book and records, according to the "Project Judging and Exhibit Guidelines" available from your advisor, the Extension Office, or at washington.osu.edu.
3. All project interviews will be scored using a score sheet according to the following scale: Superior 90 - 100, Excellent 80 – 89, and Good 70 -79. Any score sheets not picked up by members will be sent to club advisors.
4. For projects #630 and #631: guns, bows, arrows and ammunition are not permitted at judging or at any fairs..
5. Project Judging Dress Code - The goal of participating in project interviews is to help 4-H members prepare for future interview situations. With that in mind, members should dress as if they were attending a job or college interview.
 - General appearance should be neat and clean
 - No t-shirts with inappropriate language or graphics
 - Jeans or long pants are preferred
 - Skirts/shorts should reach at least the mid-thigh.
 - No low-cut tops or visible undergarments
 - Hats should not be worn during the interview. Examples of appropriate dress: button-down shirts, polos, dressy tops, 4-H club t-shirts, nice jeans, capris, skirts.
6. State Fair Selection – If a project is eligible for State Fair, qualifiers and alternates will be selected from 4-H members receiving Superior ratings attending Judging Day. The only exception is that members who cannot attend judging due to another 4-H activity, such as Leadership Camp or Shooting Sports Camp, may have their interview pre-recorded and shown to the judge to be eligible for State Fair participation.
7. Make-up Judging – members not available to attend Project Judging schedule a make-up appointment via an online link, please refer to our blog at Washington.osu.edu for details.

Fair Premium Reports (includes booth exhibit awards and premiums)

1. Each 4-H club will receive its Fair Premium Report, a computer listing of members and their projects, when booths are set up. Each 4-H member exhibiting a project will receive an Exhibit Award for each project displayed in the club booth based on respective Fair Board Rules. This report must be completed and returned to the OSU Extension staff prior to the start of the fair. Jr. Fair Board members (except for Waterford) will transfer this information to a voucher. This voucher will be given to the Sr. Fair Board. The Sr. Fair Board will include premiums for the club booth and premiums for club members who display project(s) in the club's voucher check for the year. The advisors will receive this club voucher check after the fair. Advisors are responsible for distributing the premiums to each member as listed on the club voucher summary enclosed with the check.
2. All 4-H members exhibiting still projects in the booth will receive an Exhibit Award of \$3.00 for up to five projects at Barlow Fair; \$2.00 for up to three projects at Waterford Fair; and \$3.00 for up to five projects at County Fair. Barlow Fair only - 4-H'ers can exhibit more than five projects, but will only receive premiums for five. Waterford Fair only – Hog projects being exhibited in the barns are to be reported on this form.
3. Premium reports are also available for Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts and related organizations for the Washington County Fair only. Details are listed in the Jr. Fair Building Department in the Washington County Fair section of this guide.
4. FFA and 4-H exhibitors with animal projects will receive premiums based on vouchers in their respective departments. The Jr. Fair Board (except for Waterford) will record the details of these exhibitions based on the rules and regulations provided by the Sr. Fair Board.
5. Each 4-H Club exhibiting a booth in the 4-H/Jr. Fair Building will receive a \$25.00 (Waterford, Barlow & County fairs) exhibit premium. 4-H Clubs are required to exhibit a booth at one of our local fairs. Cloverbud activities are to be listed separately, as Cloverbud projects are based on participation and items are not judged.

4-H Club Booth Exhibit Information

1. Use of the 4-H year theme is OPTIONAL for 4-H booth exhibits. Clubs will not be penalized for using other themes.
2. All 4-H Clubs are required to exhibit a booth at one of our local fairs.
3. An advisor from every 4-H Club must submit a reservation form in order to reserve a booth at the fair. The reservation form is available at the Extension Office or online at Washington.osu.edu and includes the deadline for the form to be submitted to the Extension Office.
4. Project displays should be educational and designed to show the public what the 4-H'er has accomplished, displaying project articles, not just a project book. Advisors should help each 4-H member decide the best way to display his or her project in reference to the "Project Requirements" list. 4-H labels will be furnished or clubs may make their own to fit the theme of the club exhibit.
5. For group or club projects, have the group do a good educational exhibit with their names listed. Avoid the displays with multiple plates of foods and/or posters. Use non-perishable, wrapped, food items when exhibiting 4-H Food & Nutrition projects. Please do not use foods that will spoil quickly and attract insects.

4-H Booth Judging Contest

All 4-H Club booths will be judged at each fair for the ability to attract attention, hold audience interest, and portray an easily identified theme. Exhibits from each club must show members' work, club activities, club advisors' and members' names, and community service projects. Certificates will be awarded to top booths and placed in each booth before the fair starts. Each club may only exhibit one booth at one fair and must designate at which of the fairs they will exhibit.

Booth Construction

Each 4-H Club will be asked to sign an Exhibit Agreement on the day of booth set-up that will be given to the Extension staff. All 4-H Clubs must comply by the following rules:

1. All staples, screws, thumbtacks, nails hangers, etc. used to decorate the booth must be removed when the booth is disassembled.
2. Tables, shelves, partitions, etc., must be self-supporting.
3. All painting and spraying must be done outside the building to protect the walls and floors.
4. Any significant structural damage to the booths will be charged to the club or organization.
5. Clubs and organizations should bring all of their own supplies. The Extension Office will not have supplies available.

Fair-Specific Booth Information

Waterford 4-H Club Booths

Judging - All 4-H Club Booths will be judged on Thursday or Friday.

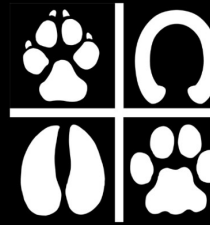

- All 4-H & FFA market livestock, dairy, breeding and horse project members are required to participate in the skillathon for each of their projects to remain in good standing and to exhibit, show and/or sell at any of our three fairs in the county.
- All youth (4-H & FFA) MUST participate in the skillathons for each project in order to be eligible to exhibit show and/or sell at the Waterford Community Fair, Washington County Fair, or Barlow Independent Fair
- Each skillathon will have age divisions: Junior (ages 8-11); Intermediate (ages 12-14); Senior (ages 15 & over). All ages will be as of January 1st of the current year.
- Livestock project members can purchase a copy of the project resource guides from the OSU Extension Office. All FFA chapters have copies of the 4-H Resource guides. This Study Guide will serve as the Source of Study Materials for exhibitors.

Project Interview and Book Judging – *What you are expected to bring....*

First Year 4-H Projects

Must purchase the appropriate 4-H Livestock Record book from OSU Extension and complete the project book(s) based on the level (beginner, intermediate, senior). Members should complete the Topic Summary and be prepared to discuss the summary with the judge. Members should also complete pages that relate to feed expenses, rate of gain, growth charts, and treatment record (where applicable). Members should also include a picture of their project animal and insert it on the appropriate page. Some pages may be optional. Judges will give a score based on the pages completed and questions asked by the judge during the interview.



Second Year and Beyond 4-H Projects

Must get a 2024 4-H Livestock Record Book from OSU Extension and complete all the activities in the record book. You need one Livestock Record Book for each project (not animal) you are raising. Keep this record book in a binder with previous project books.

FFA Members

Must bring a **printed** record book to judging – It can be off AET or a printed record book provided by your FFA advisor. If student does not bring a printed record they must see an FFA Instructor to view the AET book online.

1. **SAE Project Name**

2. **Scope** - The year, quantity, unit, and description should be listed.

3. **Animal Photo** - Choose Portfolio on the left-hand side, and then the folders of Experience/SAEs are in the top right corner. Click edit next to the photo to add a caption. You must include a caption in order for the picture to be attached to your record book. Or students can print off a hard copy and attach it to your AET record book. (numbers 4-7 are all located in the Pencil link in the Project Experience Manager section)



4. **Description** - You can copy and use the section from AET at the top or you can write in your own description that outlines other items not listed above.

5. **Time Investment** - You can copy and use the section from AET at the top or you can write in your own time description that outlines other items not listed above.

6. **Financial Investment** - You can copy and use the section from AET at the top or you can write in your own financial description that outlines other items not listed above.

7. **Learning Objectives** - At least three skill areas should be chosen, and the Planned Activities should be listed with the three Skill Areas. However, the Results or Outcome section are not required to be filled out due to the project not being completed at the time of Skillathon.

8. **Budget** - Income section-either Stock Show sale or Cash/Market Sale value and memo should be listed. Expenses section-Feed & Inventory for Resale value and memos should be listed.

9. **Journals** - Enter Feeding, washing, cleaning pens, Showmanship practice at home, etc. and how many hours.

10. **Operating Expenses** - Inventory for resale (Animal purchased), feed, bedding, etc. should be listed as operating expenses.

General Rules for Washington County, Waterford Community Fair, Barlow Fair

- Exhibitor Eligibility:** All youth exhibiting a market livestock project in Washington County must be enrolled in a Washington County 4-H Club or FFA Chapter. Members must be at least 8 years of age and enrolled in the 3rd grade as of January 1 of the current year
- Enrollment Deadline:**
- Exhibitors are responsible for submitting their own enrollment using the 4HOnline system. No paper enrollment forms are required or accepted. Youth and their parents must complete member enrollments, as they require electronic signatures providing legal consent for participation and serve as the official project enrollment record of the child.
 - All enrollments must be submitted by the **April 1, 2024** enrollment deadline so they can be reviewed and approved by the Extension Office.
 - Online Enrollment forms submitted April 2—April 14 will be charged a \$10 late fee. No Entries accepted after April 14.
- Quality Assurance:** **In accordance with the Ohio Administrative Code Section 901-19-07, youth exhibiting market livestock or lactating dairy animals must complete an approved Livestock Quality Assurance (QA) training by June 5.** Members may attend a Quality Assurance Training in any Ohio County, the member must still be accompanied by a parent. If youth are ineligible to show/sell at county level due to exhibitor or parent not attending Quality Assurance Training, you will also be ineligible to show/sell at the Ohio State Fair

- Housing Agreement:** If a market animal or breeding animal is not housed on exhibitor’s permanent resident address a Livestock Housing Agreement must be turned in to Extension Office by enrollment deadline.
- Exhibitor Conduct:** Unsportsmanlike conduct on the part of exhibitors and/or their attendants that is disgraceful to 4-H, FFA, Fair Boards, Fairs, Buyers, ODA policy/rules, will not be tolerated and will be referred to the appropriate Fair Board. The Fair Board is responsible for all final decisions.
- Care & Feeding at Fair:** The care and feeding of the animal is the responsibility of the exhibitor until the sale. Any exhibitor who does not feed and water animals properly can be asked, at the discretion of the appropriate committee and/or Fair Board, to remove their exhibit from the fair.
- Drenching:** Anyone abusing any animal, or drenching which is defined as the act of using an instrument, including a bottle, placed in an animals mouth to orally administer a liquid, food, or any other substance will not be eligible to sell and will be asked to leave fairgrounds immediately. Reference Ohio Department of Agriculture Drenching rule: ODA 901-19-01
- Premier Exhibitor Award:** 1) **Skillathon** (100 possible) —Actual score received at skillathon. Make up skillathon participants are ineligible. 2) **Showmanship** (100 possible) —100-1st place; 97-2nd place; 94-3rd place; 91-4th place; 88-5th place; 85-6th place or brought back from ‘heat’ to final drive.; 82 for remaining exhibitors. 3) **Market Class** (50 possible) —50 points champion; 49 points reserve; 48 points all 1st places; 47-2nd place; and so on. No exhibitor will receive less than 35 points for successfully raising their animal and being eligible to show. 4) **To break a tie** the committee will go back to the skillathon score to determine a winner. If there is still a tie the junior fair show committee will give exhibitors a question to answer and the tie will be broken by committee.

General Rules for Washington County, Waterford Community Fair, Barlow Fair (Continued)

- Sale Pictures:** Premier Exhibitor, Grand Champion, and Reserve Champion will have their picture taken with buyers immediately following the sale of the animal in the designated picture area.
- Market Classes:** Will be determined by weight after weigh-in. All market classes will be broken up by FairEntry and verified by one senior fair board and one committee member. No committee members of fair board members that have junior fair exhibitors in those prospective shows is eligible to assign classes. **All market animals are required to sell.**
- Spares:** All spares tagged in after primary animals can be shared only by brothers and sisters. Animals at tag in are assigned to exhibitors and only the spare may be shared brothers or sisters. Animals assigned to exhibitors at tag in may not be switched at fair weigh in. Spare animals are in case a project animal dies or does not make fair weight. This allows exhibitors to have a back up project animal.
- Order of Sales:** **County Fair: Premier Exhibitor, Grand Champion, Reserve Champion, Overall 3rd, 4th, 5th followed by order of placing from light weight to heavy weight. Co. Fair Market steer rate of gain sells 6th. Barlow: Premier Exhibitor, Grand Champion, Reserve Champion, Overall 3rd, 4th, 5th followed by order of placing from light weight to heavy weight. Waterford: Grand Champion, Reserve Champion, Premier Exhibitor followed by order of placing from light weight to heavy weight.**
- Sale Excuse Form:** If a member is unable to attend the livestock auction due to illness/Injury, death in the family, or away at college; a sale excuse form must be submitted and approved.
- Requirements to Sell:** Participation required in Market and Showmanship classes. Must participate in skillathon. Exhibitor & 1 parent/guardian must attend Quality Assurance Training or have passed test-out option.
- Show Requirements:** You must show your own animal in the market and showmanship classes. Exceptions are only accepted by the fair boards in extreme circumstances.
- Buyer Thank You Posters:** Exhibitors must make a Thank You poster for their previous buyer. Size/Shape—Minimum of 11x17; maximum of 22x28; must be able to be hung from a wire. New or first year exhibitors are to make a poster thanking all previous year's buyers. Judging based on originality, neatness, and creativity in relaying a "Thank You" message to last year's livestock buyers. Exhibitor's name and age must appear on the front of the poster. Posters must be in place by the conclusion of weigh-in. Three cash prizes will be paid separately by sponsors. 1st - \$15, 2nd - \$10, 3rd - \$5 in each specie group
- ODA Rules & Health Requirements:** (see the ODA rules for full text)
- ODA requires animal health records be kept for the following amount of time after the fair.
 - Poultry, Rabbit – 1 year
 - Sheep, Goats (Required by federal law) – 5 years
 - Beef, Dairy Beef – 2 years
 - Dairy Cows & Heifers – 5 years
 - Swine – 3 years
 - **Once a market animal is tagged for Washington County, it cannot be used by more than one youth member (except spares). If shown outside (jackpot shows, etc.) of Jr livestock show/exhibitions, a project animal may only be the youth exhibitor or family members. A market project cannot be shown as a breeding animal and breeding project cannot be shown as a market animal.**
 - **All market, dairy, and breeding animals exhibited at a junior livestock exhibition must be fully owned by the exhibitor as evidenced by a bill of sale or registration, including all showing rights, and in the complete custody and care of the exhibitor on or before possession deadlines.**
 - **Dairy, beef, goat, and sheep breeding livestock may be leased by county deadline.**
 - All market species are guided by the rules of the state of Ohio, including:

- Fair Veterinarian:** Per the Ohio Administrative Code 901-19-04 thru 901-19-06, Only the fair veterinarian may administer a prescription drug or over the counter drug during the fair where animal is being exhibited
- Washington County Fair Only – Protest Procedure:** Protests must be received by the Secretary of the Fairboard (on official form) accompanied by a protest fee of \$100. Protests must be filed by 10:00 pm the day of the show. All protests will be heard by the Sr Fairboard.

Waterford Community Fair

The Waterford Fair is not considered an agricultural society and does not receive any state money to operate the county Jr. Fair Hog Show or 4-H booths as do the other two fairs in the county. All funds to operate the market hog exhibition are derived by the Waterford Fair Board and a percentage from each exhibitor's hog sold. These funds are used to repair the facilities, pay for utilities, judges, premiums and other costs incurred by the Waterford Fair Board.

# Allowed:	Tag-in up to 2 and sell 1. Each exhibitor is limited to showing and selling only 1 market hog (barrow-castrated male only NO gilts) at the Waterford Community Fair.
Animal Age/Breed:	Hogs should weigh 55-60# in May year of fair. Barrow (castrated males only) No Gilts (females)
Male Anatomy:	Responsibility of Exhibitor & Parents-Castration should be done and healed by tag in.
Stall/Pen Reservations:	Enrollment serves as pen reservation. <i>If you want to share a pen with someone or have a pen request other than a sibling, notify Chris by June 15.</i> If you are not able to take your hog to the fair, notify Chris Campbell (740-984-4646) by July 31st when possible. This is due to limited space in the hog barn.
Hog Pens:	Exhibitors shall keep their animal's pen, the aisle, and general barn area clean and free of manure and debris during their stay at the fair. Exhibitors will not be permitted to store feed or show equipment in the barn. All animals shall be cared for by exhibitor until the close of the fair. Failing to do so after being warned shall result in loss of right to sell your hog.
Fair Weights:	Minimum 220# Maximum 280#
Early Hog Arrival:	If you know for sure which hog you are bringing, and it will not be over or under weight, you can bring your hog and pen it on Wednesday between 9:00 am – 3:00 pm. All hogs penned early will be weighed after the last trailer is unloaded on Wednesday evening. It will still be the exhibitor's responsibility to bring the hog to the scales.
Fair Weigh-in Times:	Wednesday of fair, 5-6pm Last Name A thru G, 6-7pm Last Name H thru L, 7-8pm Last Name M-Z. Hogs will be weighed ONLY ONCE Waterford Fair Grounds. Hogs must be clean and ear tag must be readable. Only one exhibitor and one parent will be permitted to help move the hog from the trailer, through weigh in and on to the hog pen.
Drug Use Forms:	Complete online DUNF form prior to weigh-in. Animal is to be drug free at TIME OF WEIGH-IN. Parent Signature is required unless exhibitor is 18 years of age and older.
Ractopamine Form:	Complete online Ractopamine (Paylean) affidavit prior to weigh in. All hog project exhibitors must complete this form at weigh in and be signed by the exhibitor and parent. Exhibitors must turn in completed affidavit in the barn near the show arena after weighing in your hog.

Market Hog Rules (continued)

- Care & Feeding at Fair:** The care and feeding of the animal is the responsibility of the exhibitor until the sale. Any exhibitor who does not feed and water animals properly can be asked, at the discretion of the appropriate committee and/or Fair Board, to remove their exhibit from the fair.
- Grooming:** Hogs **must** be clean and ear tags readable. All barrows must have a measurable 1/2" of body hair, underline included. Ears and Tail may be a shorter length. You do not have to clip your pig, this is for exhibitors that want to clip their pig.
- Showmanship:** PARTICIPATION REQUIRED to sell. Winners in each age division required to move up to the next division the following year. MUST show own project animal to be eligible to sell.
- Exhibitor Injury** If the exhibitor has an injury that would make it unsafe for them to be in the show ring they will not have to show in showmanship, but their hog will need to be shown in the market class by an exhibitor that is showing a hog at the Waterford Fair. The exhibitor is also required to be at the fair on show day and at the time of the sale.
- Hog Pen Area:** During the hog show, exhibitors 13 and under are permitted to have one parent in hog pen area and no parents permitted for exhibitors over 13, unless the parent is working in the barn on show day.
- Buyer Pictures:** Will be taken by the exhibitor. It is the exhibitor and their parents responsibility to have their picture taken by one of the two options. It is not the responsibility of the Waterford Fair Board or the hog committee.
Option 1: Exhibitor will take pictures prior to coming to fair.
Option 2: Exhibitor can take their pictures with the fair banner on Thursday from 11am to 6pm. Exhibitor must provide a 5 X 7 Color Photo to the buyer at the Hog sale.
- Thank You Posters** Buyer thank you posters will be judged at the fair and must be in place by Thursday evening of the fair. Please list exhibitor's name & age on front of poster. Everyone is required to display a poster.
- Sale Order & Pictures:** Champion, Reserve Champion, and Premier Exhibitor will have their picture taken with buyers immediately following the sale of the animal in the designated picture area.
- Disqualifications:** Stags not allowed.
 Anyone abusing any animal, drenching, or injecting any foreign substance into animals will not be eligible to show or sell and will be asked to leave the fair grounds.
 Any Exhibitor caught blatantly violating a rule such as running your hog across the scales twice, then you will be asked to leave the fairgrounds and your family will be band for one year from show.
 The exhibition is subject to the rules and regulations of the Ohio Department of Agriculture.
- Sale Deductions:** 4% of sale price deducted for facility upkeep, and a membership ticket price will also be deducted in the amount of \$12.
- Promotion of Sale:** Promotion of the sale is important for all participants. Each member must personally contact at least two (2) buyers. A thank you note and picture should be sent to all buyers after the sale.
- Sale Donation Policy:** Announcement will take place after the animal is sold and will be announced as follows: Exhibitor (name) is donating a portion of this sale to the (charity/project).
- Type of Sale:** **Partial Terminal** – Only Grand & Reserve Champion must go to slaughter

Rules and Regulations for County and Exempted Village Fair Exempt Rules

1. Each school may have the following booths:
 One (1) booth for Elementary One (1) booth for Jr. High One (1) booth for High School
2. Any type of art work or handicraft done by the students may be displayed.
3. There is no limit to how much or how little material may be used but the display should be colorful and eye-catching.
4. Each booth will receive \$25 to defray the cost of exhibiting.
5. There will be no judging or competition. All booths will receive the same premium amount.
6. The display booths are approximately 10 feet by 5 feet, but will vary in size. Therefore, you should not make a panel exactly 8 feet, as it may not fit the booth.
7. Each individual piece of artwork should be marked by a card bearing student's name, grade, and teacher's name.
8. Each booth will display an 8-inch x 10-inch card on which will the following: Name of School, Type of Booth (Elementary, Jr. High, or High School), Enrollment, Executive Head or Principal's Name.

Boy Scouts of America Displays

1. Every registered Boy Scout in **Allotahak Council** who resides in Washington Co. is eligible.
2. Each exhibitor must purchase a Washington County Jr. Fair Exhibitor **wrist band**. This **wrist band** allows the boy to enter the fair free daily. Rides are not included with these wrist bands.
3. The projects may be anything made by the Boy Scout from the previous 2 years. Projects may be from school, church, troop meetings, or made at home. A Boy Scout may enter up to 5 projects. He will be awarded a participation ribbon and \$3.00 per project (maximum of 5 projects) regardless of placing. First through fifth place ribbons will be awarded in each interest Area/Age level.

- The Boys Scouts will receive a premium of \$25 per booth.
- Projects are to be turned in at the Jr. Fair Building at the Washington County Fairgrounds on **Wednesday & Thursday from 2:00—9:00 pm. Projects can be picked up Tuesday 6:00—8:00 pm.**

Girl Scout Displays

- Every registered Girl Scout in **Girl Scouts of Black Diamond Council** who resides in Washington Co. is eligible.
- Each exhibitor must purchase a Washington County Jr. Fair Exhibitor **wrist band**. This **wrist band** allows the girl to enter the fair free daily. Rides are not included with these wrist bands.
- The Girl Scouts will receive \$25 per booth. The projects may be anything made by the Girl Scout from the previous 2 years. Projects may be from school, church, troop meetings, or made at home. A Girl Scout may enter one project **from each of the 7 Girl Scout Legacy Areas**. She will be awarded a participation ribbon and \$3.00 per project (maximum of 5 projects) regardless of placing. First through fifth place ribbons will be awarded in each interest Area/ Age level. (Ex. **Artist: Daisy, Brownies, Junior, Cadet, Senior, Ambassador levels are judged separately.**)
- All exhibitors will receive an attractive patch for their sash or vest. All baked goods and candy must be made from scratch and include the recipe. For fair display purposes, Girl Scouts will enter 2 photographs of their baked goods project. One photo is to be a close-up of the baked good and the other photo is to be of the Girl Scout presenting the baked good item. No kits are to be used, except by Daisies, 1st/2nd grade Brownies.
- Projects are to be turned in at the Jr. Fair Building at the Washington County Fairgrounds on **Wednesday & Thursday from 2:00—9:00 pm. Projects can be picked up Tuesday 6:00—8:00 pm.**
- Please use 2 cards to mark your display. The cards can be index cards or something larger. We plan to make both cards visible after the projects are judged. On the judges' card, please type or print the follow: Which **Legacy Area, Girl Scout Age Level the previous year**, Materials used, Procedure in doing project, Knowledge gained or reason made. On a separate card, again in bold letters so it can be read by fairgoers: Girl Scout's name, troop number, service unit and leaders' names.
- When the projects are turned in, the Girl Scout will purchase her Jr. Fair Exhibitor wrist band in the Fair Board Office.
- A Girl Scout may enter one project per Legacy Area. The Legacy Areas are based on the new Legacy Badges.

Criteria for judging: neatness, length of time involved, creativity, age-appropriateness, and complexity. To encourage Girl Scout ideal, extra consideration will be given to volunteerism, leadership and community service in deciding award winners. For instance, you might bake cookies for your display. If you bake cookies and take them to a nursing home, you would be rated higher.

Neither the Fair Board nor Girl Scouts are responsible for loss of or damage to projects.

Troop Opportunity-Did your troop do a service project or activity they would like to document and display at the fair? There will be an area for troop displays.

Troop Meeting Projects-These are projects that were done at troop meetings and completed by several members. All age levels will be judged together.

Agricultural Education/FFA Displays in the Jr. Fair Building

- A Jr. Fair wristband must be purchased be eligible for premiums and awards.
- Only members of FFA are eligible to exhibit in this department.
- All exhibits must be from projects or other supervised practice conducted during the school year. All entries must be approved by the exhibitor's FFA Advisor.
- Exhibitors assume responsibility and expense for bringing exhibits to and taking them from the fair.
- These exhibits shall be on the grounds and in their respective places by 8:00 pm Thursday.
- All exhibits will be released at a time designated by Fair Board. Exhibits removed by the exhibitor before Fair Board approved time, without special permission, may forfeit awards and premiums.
- Exhibitors can display as many exhibits as they choose but will be paid premiums on up to 40 entries only.
- FFA members may exhibit in this section (as in all others) until the year in which they attains the age of 19.
- All appropriate displays will receive an "A" rating or a "B" rating. Some displays may not receive a rating. Fruits/vegetables showing noticeable insect or disease injury will not be rated. Judging will be based on freedom from blemishes, condition, color, size and uniformity. All items must be identified by variety.
- No premiums will be given for exhibited project books.
- In order for FFA members to receive premiums, they must remove all items either Tuesday from 8-10pm or Wednesday 9am-noon.

Washington County Overall Showmanship Contest:

1. Each livestock showmanship contest (rabbit, poultry, turkey, dairy feeder, goat, sheep, beef, dairy, horse) will select a 1st and 2nd place County Showmanship Winner from the current age divisions (Junior, Intermediate, Senior) to participate in the Overall Showmanship Contest.
2. All current county showmanship 1st place winners (rabbit, poultry, turkey, dairy feeder, goat, sheep, beef, dairy, horse) will participate in the Overall Showmanship Contest.
3. If the 1st place county showmanship winner is unable to participate in the Overall Show Showmanship Contest, the 2nd place county showmanship winner will participate. If the 1st place and 2nd place both decline there will be no one to represent that specie in the Overall Showmanship Contest.
4. Contestants will supply nine animals and the necessary show equipment for the contest, with the exception of rabbits, poultry, & turkey who will provide one animal and horses will provide 2 animals.
5. To assign animals to each contestant, there will be a random drawing to match animals with contestants. Numbers will be drawn for each specie show.
6. Judging will be based on a point system of one through nine. The participant with the lowest score will be the Overall Showmanship Champion. If there is a tie with the lowest number score, tie breaking questions will determine the overall winner.
7. Contestants will show all species, including the specie for which they are the county winner. This will make a total of up to nine classes in the competition.
8. Contestants will be judged by adults secured by the Livestock and Horse Committees.
9. Judges will be limited to 10 minutes per class to do both judging and placing of the participants.
10. 🔄 Scoring will be tallied by one Fairboard Member, one Livestock Committee member, and one Impartial Adult.
11. The dress code for the competition will be long pants, sleeved shirt and boots. No hats.
12. Overall Showmanship Contest winners are eligible to win the Overall Showmanship contest more than once.
13. Awards will be provided to the Overall Specie Winners, Overall Showmanship Grand Champion and Overall Showmanship Reserve Champion.

 - (1) Originate directly from a flock or hatchery which is a participant in the national poultry improvement plan for the eradication of disease and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph;
 - (2) Originate directly from a flock which has had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease within twelve months preceding the opening date of exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph;
 - (3) Have had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease, within ninety days, preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or
 - (4) Be tested for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease upon arrival at the exhibition by a tester approved by the Ohio department of agriculture and found negative.
 - (B) The rapid whole blood test shall not be used to test turkeys for compliance with the requirements of paragraphs (A)(2), (A)(3) and (A)(4) of this rule.
 - (C) Waterfowl, doves and, pigeons are exempt from this rule.

WASHINGTON COUNTY 4-H HORSE PROGRAM GUIDELINES & REQUIREMENTS

Washington County 4-H members are eligible to register two riding project animals for the 4-H year by May 30 of that year. Only one horse project is permitted to attend a Performance Against The Standards (PAS) and State Fair shows. Two (2) riding animals and one (1) production are permitted to attend the Washington County Fair. The State's rules for the Performance Against The Standards (PAS) Show will be followed. Find them at: <http://horse.osu.edu> Horse projects are not permitted in more than one county at a time.

The county committee will allow an animal to be used by more than one member within the same immediate family. However, only one member may attempt to qualify for State Fair. Both members may compete on one horse at County Fair. In the event of both members qualifying for a championship class, the family will decide who competes.

4-H project horses may be leased by exhibitors. Leased projects must follow regulations outlined in the Ohio 4-H Lease Agreement. A completed lease agreement MUST be on file at the Extension Office by May 30 for eligibility. Lease agreements are available at the Extension Office and on line at: www.washington.osu.edu

Members must fill out a Horse Project Animal Declaration Form. Complete one form for each project animal—A copy may be obtained at the Extension Office by May 30, 4:00 pm. Forms received between June 1-7 will be assessed a \$20 late fee. No forms will be accepted after June 8 no exceptions.

Mandatory Requirements for 4-H Horse Project Members:

- a. Each member is required to complete the State Equistep training. This training is provided in person at the Mandatory Parent/Member meeting and members are required to complete an online quiz at the end of the training per State 4-H horse requirements. This training must be completed annually and covers helmet safety requirements.
- b. County Skillathon is required for ALL 4-H members to remain in good standing and to exhibit and/or show at any of our three fairs.
 - All horse project members will be required to participate in Skillathon. Please see 4-H Calendar and/or Junior Fair Activities Guide for date, location and make-up dates/times.
 - All members taking a horse project must participate in the Horse Skillathon on July 20 (Horseless Horse project members will participate in non-livestock project judging on July 11 at the Junior fair Building times will be announced later) at the Washington County Fair Junior Fair building 6:00pm.
 - Make-up date is August 5, 6:00pm – youth must call to reserve an appointment time with a \$20 fee.
- c. Lessons, instruction, and advice for the member are encouraged. As long as the member is present in a learning situation, such assistance can include occasional riding or handling of the horse by another person, but cannot include regular training and care of the horse within 30 days of the completion of the Junior Fair Horse Shows at the Washington County Fair. Showing a 4-H member's project animal in a class at a show is not considered training. However, if a project animal is shown by someone other than the 4-H member in an open or breed from 30 days prior through the completion of the Junior Fair Horse Shows at the Washington County Fair, the 4-H member must be present and must show the project horse in at least one class at that same show.
- d. Helmet Policy for the Ohio 4-H Horse Program: "All youth age 19 and under, participating in any 4-H equestrian activity, are required to wear properly fitted protective headgear which meets or exceeds current ASTM (American Society for Testing and Materials)/SEI (Safety Equipment Institute) standards with the chin harness securely fastened at all times while riding or driving an equine.
- e. It is the responsibility of the rider, or the parent or guardian of the youth participant, to make sure that the headgear worn complies with appropriate safety standards for protective headgear intended for equestrian use, and is properly fitted and in good condition. The Ohio 4-H Horse Program, Show Committees, Officials, Extension Personnel and Volunteer Leaders are not responsible for checking headgear worn for such compliance.
- f. The Ohio 4-H Horse Program, Show Committees, Officials, Extension Personnel and Volunteer Leaders make no representation or warranty, expressed or implied, about any protective headgear, and cautions riders that death or serious injury may result despite wearing such headgear, as no helmet can protect against all foreseeable injuries in equestrian activities.

WASHINGTON COUNTY 4-H HORSE PROGRAM GUIDELINES & REQUIREMENTS (continued)

- g. The Ohio 4-H Horse Program, Show Committees, Officials, Extension Personnel and Volunteer Leaders may, at his/her discretion, check a participant's protective headgear for proper standards. If the youth is found to be wearing unapproved, defective, or improperly fitted headgear, he/she will not be permitted to participate in riding or driving activities until proper headgear is acquired."
- h. All 4-H horse project members are required to attend one Equine Educational Riding Sessions in order to participate in the shows and events at the Washington County Fair. However, members are welcome to attend as many sessions as they wish. Members may bring their own horses to designated sessions but are not required to. Exhibitors do not need to bring project horses to attend. We strongly encourage parents to stay at the sessions so they are better equipped to help their child to better prepare for the fair and other competitions. See horse packet for current year session topics, dates, times and locations.
- YOUTH planning on participating in any PAS to qualify for State Fair MUST complete their required attendance at least ONE Equine Riding Session and the Equistep training BEFORE trying out at ANY PAS show.
 - **Youth enrolled in 4-H horse projects must also complete the mandatory Ohio 4-H Equistep training modules. Any youth not completing the training will not be permitted to attend county or state fairs.**
- i. Performance Against The Standards Qualifier show(s) will be held to accommodate the membership. Members are limited to four (4) pre-selected classes (minimum of two). Classes offered will be determined by member pre-registration. **YOUTH planning on participating in any PAS to qualify for State Fair MUST complete their required attendance at least ONE Equine Riding Session BEFORE trying out at ANY PAS show.
- J. At all 4-H horse shows, only Show Officials are permitted in the arena when judging is occurring.
- K. In case of inclement weather, parents are asked to check with their club's Organizational Advisor and/or the Extension Office on the day of the scheduled shows to verify that the show is still scheduled.
- L. **Hardship Clause** - If one member has registered two (2) riding animals exclusively, that individual will use the remaining project animal. The exception shall be when two or more family members register the same horses then the following Hardship Clause shall apply. If one (1) riding project animal is registered, then follow the Hardship Clause as outlined.
- a. If a project horse dies you may declare a new project.
 - b. If a horse is seriously ill or injured and a vet examines the horse and submits a signed statement that this horse will be unable to finish the year as a project horse, you may declare a new project.
 - c. The committee reserves the right to inspect the original project and may speak to the vet that did the exam.
 - d. If a horse is ill or injured and the vet says he will be able to show at the fair, this is not considered to be a horse that is unable to finish the year as a project and the 4-H'er will not be permitted to adopt another project.
 - e. 4-H member will not be permitted to switch back to the original project after member has adopted a new project for that year.
 - f. The above stated reasons to claim a new project will not be altered in any way and are to be the only reasons for a project switch.
 - g. Hardship animals are not eligible for State Fair.
 - h. Abuse of this clause may result in it being dropped for future years. Member cooperation is required for the good of this program.
 - i. All other situations may be presented to the Saddle Horse Committee and decisions will be made on a case by case basis.

At County Fair Horse Shows:

1. There are to be NO ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES brought to a 4-H function by any parent, guest or 4-H member. THIS WILL BE POSTED AND ENFORCED.
2. There is to be NO SMOKING in any of the barns/show arena/announcer stand by anyone at any 4-H function.
3. There will be three approved Stewards with one/two alternates. There must be a vote of three on any decision.
4. Horses are required to be stalled on the fairgrounds. All horses need to be in place by 7pm Friday August 30, 2024 and may not leave the fairgrounds until Tuesday September 3, 2024 at 4pm.

5. Safety Rules for Shows

- Grooming is not permitted in the aisles due to safety reasons.
- No riding in barns.
- No horses standing in spectator area.
- NO HORSEPLAY.
- NO HORSES OR LIVESTOCK ARE ALLOWED ON BALL FIELDS.
- Horses are to be kept in horse related areas.
- Only project animals may be shown at County Fair Shows.
- No riding on fairgrounds except in the warm-up area and arena. Horses are to be led to and from the arena or paddock area.
- Only one rider per horse- No riding double.
- No mistreatment of horses.
- All exhibitors are requested to strip stalls before leaving grounds.

- Participants in Walk-Trot Equitation & Walk-Trot Pleasure classes are not eligible to canter in Gymkhana classes.
- Members must complete a showmanship class to be eligible for high point award.
- High Point Individual - A trophy will be awarded in two divisions, Junior and Senior, to the horse and rider combination with the highest number of points in regular classes, skillathon, and showmanship scores. A rider may not receive both Grand and Reserve Champion in the High Point Competition.
- High Point Ranch Division - A trophy will be awarded in two divisions, Junior and Senior, to the horse and rider combination with the highest number of points in designated ranch classes, skillathon, and showmanship scores..
- 2 & 3 Year Olds Production Division – Rosette ribbons will be awarded to the horse and rider combinations with the highest number of points in classes 9,10 and 11.
- Miniature Lead In Trail Class will be awarded rosette ribbons.
- Awards will be awarded to Grand Champions in Grand Champion Classes.
- Premium Awards paid as follows: 1st place \$5.00; 2nd place \$4.00; 3rd place \$3.00; 4th place \$2.00; and 5th place \$1.00. There will be no placing premiums in Grand Champion classes.
- Premium Award: \$7.00 per animal. (Limit 4 per exhibitor)
- Horses must be stalled at the fair grounds and be in place by 7:00pm Friday. Horses will be released on Tuesday at 4:00pm.

Horse Groom & Clean & Hippology Event—Horse Arena, Monday, 10:00 am

- Each contestant must be currently enrolled in a 4-H or FFA project and in good standing, contestants must be at least 8 years old and in 3rd grade and not be more than 18 years of age as of January 1st of the current year.
- Teams consist of 3 members and an adult handler. No attire change will be allowed, contestants must start and finish the competition in the same outfit. No gloves or overalls may be worn.
- One handler is required per team. Handlers hold the horse during the contest and must be 18 years of age or older. Handlers must maintain and have control of the horse/ pony at all times. They will not coach team members in any way
- Horse /ponies must be 13.2h or taller with a minimum body condition score of 4. Grooming products that make it easier for dirt to be removed from the hair coat are strictly prohibited prior to or after being muddied. Each horse must arrive wearing a properly fitted nylon or leather halter. Silver show halters or rope halters are not allowed.
- Contest procedures include a written test(15minutes), grooming(30 minutes), and showmanship(10 minutes). Each team will provide own grooming tools, no electric or battery powered equipment may be used. All 3 members will be judged on showmanship with pattern being determined by judges. The only equipment change will be a chain lead strap to replace the lead rope used while grooming for showmanship. No change of halters is allowed.
- There will be approximately a 2 hour drying time once mud is applied uniformly. More time may be allowed if weather is damp. During this time there will be a Hippology Event offered for team members and 4-H and FFA members. This event will test the members knowledge of horses.

Required Forms

- All required paperwork (Permission to participate and project animal declaration) MUST be completed, signed and turned in by 4:00PM May 30 of current project year. If a member misses the deadline they may turn in required paperwork by June 7, 2024 with a \$20 late fee. NO paperwork will be taken after June 7, 2024 at 4:00pm.
- Immunization Forms- Complete this required form, if you are taking your horse(s) to the Equine Education Riding Sessions, Washington County Fair, PAS Shows, or Barlow Fair. This form is due to the Extension Office by MAY 30.
- County Fair: Members must complete forms and return them to the Extension Office by August 5 so that preparations can be made for the Junior Fair Horse Shows at the County Fair. Members will need to enter classes in Fair Entry by August 5, 2024. If these forms are not received by the due date, you will not be eligible to show or exhibit your horse(s) at the Washington County Fair.
